And yes, I grew a beard in Australia. All the men seem to have beards and tattoos there - at least many of them do. I still have the beard, along with incredibly vivid memories.



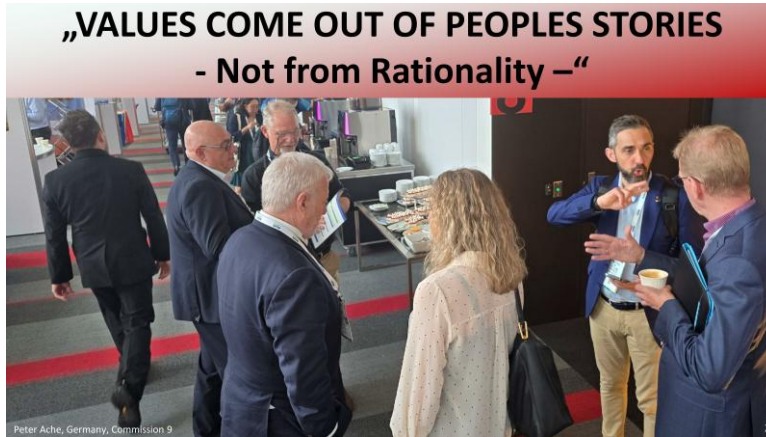
Once again, we brought a network together, with the active members of Commission 9 making a substantial contribution.

Our exceptional colleague **Kevin Brogan** travelled all the way from the west coast of Australia specifically to strengthen his engagement with FIG and with us. What an honour!

We pointed out, that decisions about investing in real estate always are risky decisions and they are



not always following rational rules. Therefore, we stated that Real Estate Values are coming out of the people's history, there individual circumstances and them believes what is worth to buy and what is not. To value property and to analyse the markets we do need prices that were actually achieved, the circumstances of the transactions, and their associated geospatial information.
