- Project description => screening
- Consideration of alternatives
- Baseline studies)
- Review of effects) => scoping
- Presentation of results)
- · Consultation with affected parties
- Public participation
- Mitigation measures

International Environmental Impact Assessmen



Procedure

- in advance of permitting (e.g. Australia, Canada, USA) or
- integral part of permitting procedure (e.g. EU) or
- independent process

Type of EIA

• project-specific, strategic (e.g. region, industry, policy)

Screening - need for EIA?

• size and nature of project - thresholds, definitions

Scoping - content of EIA?

significant factors – consultation with authorities
